



2. Gospel text: Mark 13:33-37

Be on your guard! Be alert! You do not know when that time will come. It's like a man going away: He leaves his house and puts his servants in charge, each with their assigned task, and tells the one at the door to keep watch.

Therefore, keep watch because you do not know when the owner of the house will come back -

whether in the evening, or at midnight, or when the rooster crows. If he comes suddenly, do not let him find you sleeping. What I say to you, I say to everyone: "Watch!"

People can read over the text again and pick out a word or short phrase that strikes them and say it out loud.

When everyone has had a chance to speak, people can silently listen to what God is saying to them in their hearts linking it with themselves, their community, society or the world. Then some sharing.

NB This is not time for argument.

4. Background notes for Mark 13:33-37

When Jesus speaks these words he is in Jerusalem and will not leave it alive. He has enraged the Jewish elders, overturning the changing tables in the Temple, publicly and provocatively. They are more determined than ever to get rid of him.

A the time of Mark's writing, traumatic events were affecting the Christians. There had been a Jewish call to arms against the Romans which resulted in the violent destruction of Jerusalem and the Temple. Nero had unleashed a horrific persecution of Christians in Rome.

Mark is urging the people he addresses to stay awake in these dark times of history, trusting in God's faithfulness who accompanied Jesus on the cross and will accompany them through every suffering. The Temple is gone but God is in control, God who is about melting hearts, compassion and restoration. They need to watch out for the new signs of God's presence, creating new spaces of flourishing, replacing the old destructive ones.

Reflection Question for Mark 13:33-37

'Making new spaces' - are you aware of leaving behind 'old spaces' to find life in new ones?

2. Gospel text: Mark 1:1-8

The beginning of the Good News about Jesus Christ, the Son of God, as it is written in Isaiah the Prophet:

"See, I will send my messenger ahead of you, who will prepare your way;
A voice of one crying in the wilderness:
'Prepare the way for the Lord.
Make straight paths for him."

And so John the Baptist appeared in the wilderness, preaching a Baptism of

repentance for the forgiveness of sins. The people of Jerusalem went out to him. Confessing their sins they were baptised by him in the River Jordan. John wore clothing made of camel's hair, with a leather belt around his waist, and he ate locusts and wild honey. And this was his message: 'After me comes the one more powerful.

I am not worthy to stoop down and untie the thong of his sandals. I baptize you with water, but he will baptise you with the Holy Spirit'.

3. Quiet time...

People can read over the text again and pick out a word or short phrase that strikes them and say it out loud.

When everyone has had a chance to speak, people can silently listen to what God is saying to them in their hearts linking it with themselves, their community, society or the world. Then some sharing.

NB This is not time for argument.

4. Background notes for Mark 1:1-8

These very first verses of Mark'st Gospel sound an irresistible hope. The announcement of the 'Good news' is not the dreaded approach of a victorious, conquering army, as it would have been for the Roman occupiers. It is not the message of an imperial herald; but of a man at the margins of society, announcing God's coming with healing and forgiveness. The desert setting is far from the sphere of influence of political or religious rulers.

John's way of baptising was to plunge people into the strong flow of the river, a startling way of cleansing, of shaking them up, 'preparing the way of the Lord, making straight his paths.'

It was a call to change their world-view and live accordingly. To be open to what God wants. Jesus, coming after John, will undertake the radical quest to uncover the root causes of people's problems and usher in the incredible truth of God's tremendous, healing compassion and love available for everyone..

Mark gives Jesus the title 'Son of God', a title given to Roman Emperors but their power was neither healing or protective.

'By the Holy Spirit' - reference to the Holy Spirit was already part of the Christian baptism ritual at the time Mark was writing...

5. Reflection Question for Mark 1:1-8

'A world which pretends nothing can change' How does your experience contradict this quote?

6. Prayers

Mentioning the people and situations we want to pray for.



Lord, let us be attentive to your presence shining on us all the day through. Let us remember your tender love, your desire to restore, your healing caress.

Help us to love with tenderness - a love close and real, using our eyes to see others, our ears to hear others, to listen to the children, the poor, those who are afraid of the future.

Third Sunday of Advent 2023

As Advent continues may we join with you in bringing your light into this world. May we be bearers of your light and love by doing special acts of kindness, not cursing the darkness.

May every candle we light symbolise our longing to brighten a world of darkness and bring hope into a world of despair. May we never give up trusting in the power you give us to act with wisdom and courage.

2. Gospel text: John 1, 1-6; 19-28

There was man sent from God whose name was John. He came as a witness to testify concerning the light, so that through him all might believe. He himself was not the light; he came only as a witness to the light.

Now this was John's testimony when the Jewish leaders sent priests and Levites to ask him who he was. He did not fail to confess, but confessed freely, "I am not the Messiah".

They asked him, "Then, who are you? Are you Elijah?"

He said, "I am not." "Are you the prophet?" He answered "No"

Finally they said, "Who are you? Give us an answer to take back to those who sent us. What do you say about yourself?"

John replied, in the words of Isaiah the prophet:

"I am the voice of one calling in the wilderness, 'Make straight the way of the Lord.'"

Now the Pharisees who had been sent questioned him, "Why then do you baptise if you are not the Messiah, nor Elijah, nor the Prophet?"

"I baptise with water," John replied, "but among you stands the one who comes after me, the straps of whose sandals I am not worthy to untie."

This all happened at Bethany on the other side of the Jordan where John was baptising.

When everyone has had a chance to speak, people can silently listen to what God is saying to them in their hearts linking it with themselves, their community, society or the world. Then some sharing.

NB This is not time for argument.

4. Background notes for John 1, 1-6; 19-28

The Jewish authorities are disturbed by all the people streaming out to John, leaving Jerusalem and the Temple. Unnerved, they send down Levites, priests and Pharisees armed with a string of loaded questions based on their sacred history.

John's answers, based on the same sacred history, go far beyond their expectations or what they could have imagined. A new era is dawning inevitable and unstoppable.


The light will conquer darkness and have power to open hearts, to uncover truth and energise people to be sources of goodness. While John drew the focus away from himself, Jesus watched, listened, learned and changed.

As for the people, they have been waiting for God but God has been waiting for them.

How can we be light-bringers instead of cursing the darkness?

2. Gospel text: Luke 1:26-38

In the sixth month of Elizabeth's pregnancy God sent the angel to a town in Galilee, to a virgin pledged to a man named Joseph, a descendant of David. The virgin's name was Mary. The angel went to her and said, "Greetings, you who are highly favoured! The Lord is with you."

Mary was greatly troubled at his words and wondered what kind of greeting this might be. But the angel said to her, "Do not be afraid, Mary; you have found favour with God. You will conceive and give birth to a son, and you are to call him Jesus. He will be great and will be called the Son of the Most High. The Lord will give him the throne of his father, David, and he will reign over Jacob's descendants forever; his kingdom will never end."

"How will this be", asked Mary, "since I am a virgin?" The angel answered, "The Holy Spirit will come on you and the power of the Most High will overshadow you. So the holy one to be born will be called the Son of God. Even Elizabeth your relative is going to have a child in her old age and she who was said to be unable to conceive is in her sixth month. For no word from God will ever fail."

4. Background notes for Luke 1:26-38

Luke links the emergence of the man in the wilderness back to the home of a young girl in a small village, far from any sources of power. An unlikely starting point for a world-shaking event. This young girl has none of the certainties of John the baptist or the Jewish authorities. She is confused and disturbed. But God has sought out this person of humility and courage to hear and respond. Mary chooses to believe, fully aware who she is before God, opening her heart and mind to co-operate.

Saying 'Yes' puts Mary in a difficult, dangerous position socially, culturally and religiously but she goes on her way, pondering what has happened.

Luke links two women - regarded in Jewish society as insignificant -who really enter into what is happening and respond with faith, joy, trust and hope. They bring blessings to each other and their lives change forever. God has no longer need of a Temple.

5. Reflection Question for Luke 1:26-38

As you prepare for Christmas what will your thoughts be?
